I farm sheep and beef near Palmerston North. I usually write very early in the morning before going out on the farm to work. I have also worked as a tour guide around the country, and I lived for two years in Germany after meeting my partner – who is German - while she was visiting New Zealand.

I was attracted to this competition by the challenge of being provided a first line. I have never entered a competition with a prompt before. As soon as I read the first line, "It was 3am", the words started to flow. I wrote the story over two days, it basically poured onto the page fully formed.

I also won the 2018 Mindfood Magazine Short Story Competition, and came third in the 2019 National Flash Fiction Day Awards.

Every night, over 160 women and children are too afraid to stay in their homes in New Zealand because of violence. It is time that, as a country, we said enough is enough. I strongly urge people to support organisations that work with victims of domestic violence.
